and her husband Bruce were living in a loft-style apartment in Battersea with their daughter Else

when they decided to make the move out of London. The Kent town of Tenterden was their location of choice thanks to its proximity to the capital – a must for Bruce's job. 'Originally we were going to buy my parents' house there, as they were planning to retire to Greece,' says Siggi. 'But converting their period property into a contemporary home was too big a job for us.'

The couple looked for their own property within walking distance of the town centre. When they first saw their current home, it had a dark, dated interior. 'The beauty of this property is that it's a relatively modern build to a good standard,' Siggi explains. 'I could see that opening up the downstairs and reconfiguring the original rooms would work, so I started drawing up plans as soon as we decided to buy.'

Siggi spent three months nailing down every detail to avoid unexpected costs. Even the lighting layouts were completed before the sale had gone through. 'Often people leave this for the builders and you can end up with switches in the way of shelving units,' Siggi says. 'These sorts of things can destroy a carefully thought-out design."

Work on the house started in August 2010 but the family didn't move in straight away, choosing to stay with Siggi's parents nearby. The biggest part of the project was the kitchen extension, and Siggi had strong views on how >



me to maintain a horizontal feel to the design of the kitchen to accentuate the width of the room.'

Extending to the side of the house and removing virtually all the internal walls downstairs created a large living space - perfect for the family's new kitchen. Siggi managed the whole project and was on site every day supervising the sub-contractors. 'My husband Bruce was busy setting up his own practice around then,' she says.

The initial project took eight months to complete, with the wraparound room divider between the kitchen and sitting room added three years after they moved in due to financial constraints. Siggi used the same high-gloss surface for the divider as for the kitchen units, continuing the clean, minimalistic feel of the space. A green-topped






table and yellow chairs add a splash of colour. Siggi set up her own architect firm, Studio 9010, in 2011 and her house helps clients visualise how an outdated space can be transformed. 'I work from home so it's a great showcase,' she says. 'From outside it's an ordinary house, but it opens up into an unexpected contemporary living space.'

The family moved in just in time to celebrate Else's birthday with a party for 20 guests – as well as new puppy Arial. 'My daughter loves to sing and play the piano – the acoustics are brilliant,' Siggi says. 'It's a great space for us all to enjoy, and robust enough to deal with family life.'
